

CHAPTER 6

OTHER FUNDED PROGRAMS AND INSTITUTIONS

6.1 Campus Manitoba

6.1.1 Background

Campus Manitoba (CMB) is a consortium of Manitoba's publicly funded universities and colleges that provide access to post-secondary education to Manitobans through the use of a broad selection of learning technologies. Funded by the Council on Post-Secondary Education, CMB makes post-secondary education widely accessible, serving those who live both near and far from main campuses, or who need alternative options to begin or complete programs.

CMB began as the First Year by Distance Education (FYDE) pilot program in September 1990. FYDE provided full-time first year university study in Arts and Science by distance education in the four northern and remote centres of Dauphin, Thompson, The Pas, and Flin Flon. In 1998, the mandate of the FYDE Program was expanded, and the program was officially renamed CMB to reflect the wide-ranging course offerings at the undergraduate level.

6.1.2 Full Course Equivalent (FCE) Registrations

Over the five-year period between 1999/00 to 2003/04, FCE registrations increased by 330 (37.4%) from 883 to 1,213.

6.1.3 Credit Hours by Community

Total credit hours by community have increased from 3,660 in 1999/00 to 4,584 in 2003/04. In 2003/04, two new sites were added, Altona and Steinbach.

6.2 Inter- Universities North

6.2.1 Background

Inter-Universities North (IUN) is a consortium of UM, UW, and BU that was established in 1971/72 to deliver undergraduate courses and related student support services in communities north of the 53rd parallel. Students who register through IUN may transfer courses, grades and credits between the three universities. All courses satisfy the residency requirements for degrees at each university.

IUN is administered by KCC. IUN offers courses primarily in arts, social sciences, history, native studies and business administration. IUN also provides electives to support other university programming in the north.

The On-Site programs offered by IUN provide both full and part-time study opportunities by instructors who travel to the northern communities. Credit courses are offered in response to identified needs, subject to budget limitations.

6.2.2 On-Site Course Enrollments

As Table 6.2.2 shows, course enrollments in IUN increased sharply in 2000/01 to 2001/02 at 20.1% and 23.5% respectively but declined in 2003/04. At the same time, enrollments were consolidated in the major centres in the north.

6.3 Private Religious Institutions

6.3.1 Background

There are four private religious degree-granting institutions that receive a portion of their funding from the Council on Post-Secondary Education. This funding is to support enrollment in non-theological, non-denominational courses. The private religious institutions are the Canadian Mennonite University (CMU), Providence College and Seminary (PCS), William and Catherine Booth College (WCBC), and Steinbach Bible College (SBC). Four years of enrollment and graduation data from the private religious institutions are available: 1999/00 and 2003/04.

6.3.2 Enrollment by Program – Regular Session

As the data in Table 6.3.2 show, regular session enrollment increased at all four private religious institutions between 1999/00 and 2003/04. Overall, enrollment increased 466 or 33.7% over the five-year period.

6.3.4 Graduates by Program

Table 6.3.4 shows growth in the number of graduates at the private religious colleges between 1999 and 2003. Cumulatively, the number of graduates increased by 174 (or 67.9%) over the five-year period.
